Location: Palavas-les-Flots Beach, Montpellier & Community Park, Tippecanoe

Characters: The Dubois family - Claire (Mother), Antoine (Father), Maxime (6 years old)

Plot Summary:

During a sunny day trip to Palavas-les-Flots, Maxime was delighted to see the shimmering blue waves and playful fish jumping in the water. But when he spotted some litter on the sand, he asked, “Why is there trash on the beach?” His mom explained how it can hurt the fish, and that’s when Maxime decided to become an “Ocean Guardian.” He gathered shells, bits of colored paper, and old bottle caps, turning them into a beautiful “Peaceful Ocean” collage, showing how everything in nature can come together peacefully when we care for it. Inspired by his day at the beach, Maxime wanted to do more to help keep the ocean clean.

Experiment Objective:

To teach children about marine life, the importance of keeping our oceans clean, and the concept of peace through creative and hands-on activities. By connecting small actions to a bigger purpose, children learn about caring for the planet and how kindness can spread like waves across the sea.

Experiment Steps:

1. **Materials Needed:**

- Recycled paper, bottle caps, colored pencils, and stickers (sea creatures, shells, waves)
- A small net or reusable bag for collecting litter
- *Ocean Forests* app for digital exploration
- Cards with phrases like “Peace,” “Kindness,” and “Help” in multiple languages (e.g., “Paix,” “Paz,” “和平”)

2. **Setup:**

- On their next trip to the beach or park, Maxime and his family brought small bags to collect litter. They called it “Finding Treasure for the Ocean” because each piece they picked up made the ocean happier.
- Back home, Maxime spread out the recycled materials and started creating his “Peaceful Ocean” collage, using bottle caps as “fish scales” and blue paper for waves. He carefully placed a sticker of a dolphin at the center, saying, “Dolphins need a clean, happy home.”

3. **Procedure:**

- After showing his artwork to his family, Maxime said, “I want to make more collages and give them to my friends, so they can help too!” Claire and Antoine suggested a small “beach clean-up playdate” where Maxime could invite his friends, and they would pick up litter together.

4. **Data Recording:**

- Maxime’s “Peaceful Ocean” collage became a centerpiece on the family fridge, but he didn’t stop there. Each time he created a new one, he would draw different sea creatures, adding the names in multiple languages. He asked his parents to take pictures of all his artworks, creating a mini “Ocean Guardian” photo album.
- Antoine helped Maxime create a simple chart showing the number of pieces of litter they picked up during each beach trip. Maxime drew little dolphins swimming next to each number, saying, “We’re saving the dolphins!”
- With the *Earth Rangers* app, Maxime learned about other animals around the world, helping him understand that taking care of the earth is about helping everyone, everywhere.

5. **Results:**

- **Observations:** Maxime learned that even small pieces of litter can harm sea creatures. By picking them up, he felt proud, saying, “I’m an Ocean Guardian!” He also loved learning new words for peace and sharing them with his friends.
- **Conclusion:** Through this experiment, Maxime developed an early sense of environmental responsibility and empathy. His family’s beach clean-ups became a regular event, and they even started making it a friendly competition to see who could find the most “treasure” to help keep the beach clean. Maxime’s school picked up on the idea, and soon, the whole class was creating “Peaceful Ocean” collages, each child adding their own touch and sharing how they could keep the world beautiful.

Core Plot:

Maxime’s journey as an “Ocean Guardian” wasn’t just about cleaning up litter; it was about understanding that every small action makes a difference. Whether picking up a bottle cap or learning to say “peace” in a new language, he felt like he was helping the ocean stay beautiful and peaceful. His collages turned into colorful expressions of love for the sea, and every time a new wave crashed at Palavas-les-Flots, Maxime smiled, knowing he was doing his part to keep it happy. When his parents saw how much he cared, they knew that this little lesson in kindness would ripple out, inspiring others.
