Location: Morgan Family Living Room, Tippecanoe & Local Community Center, Montpellier

Characters: The Morgan family - Kate (Mother), Dave (Father), Ella (5 years old)

Plot Summary:

It was a rainy Saturday afternoon in Tippecanoe, and Ella was feeling a bit restless. "Let's make puppets and put on a show!" said Kate, pulling out a box of craft supplies. 5. Results:
