## **Customizing and Adapting Your Kits: Tips and Inspirations**

- Build Modular Kits That Grow Over Time:
  - Imagine starting with a **basic story kit**, and over the months, adding new character cards, locations, and themes. One month, it might be **underwater adventures**, and the next, **space exploration**. These additions keep the kits exciting, giving kids something new to look forward to.
  - Example: A "Traveling Animal Friends" kit can begin with animals exploring the forest, and then expand to include underwater scenes, deserts, and even outer space.
- Adjust the Difficulty for Different Age Groups:
  - Some kits can be simplified or made more challenging by adjusting the activities. For younger children, provide more visual cues and straightforward instructions. For older kids, add layers of complexity that encourage problem-solving and creativity.
  - **Example:** A **building kit** might start with assembling simple blocks to make a house, but for older children, the challenge could be to create a neighborhood with roads, gardens, and shops, encouraging them to think about **urban planning.**

## • Create Local Story Maps and Adventures:

- Use story maps to create **personalized adventures** in your neighborhood. Encourage kids to draw their own maps with favorite local spots, adding characters, obstacles, or "treasure" stops. Each map can tell a new story, and kids can swap them with friends to see how different everyone's adventures are.
