Title: Exploring the Possibilities: Is Poverty a Consciousness or a

Material Thing?

Objective: Analyze the concept of poverty from different possibilities and reasoning, considering both perspectives of consciousness and material existence.

Content:

Introduction:

Possibility 1: Poverty as Consciousness
